Main objectives of the WP6

- Identifying the legal barriers concerning protected areas
- Propose adequate solutions to remove hindering to the creation of ecological networks



the NATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Pursuant to Action 6.1, a series of six national assessments on the legal situation of Austria, France, Italy, Germany, Slovenia and Switzerland with regards to protected areas was carried out by PP9 European Academy of Bolzano (CIPRA produced the study on French protected areas) under the coordination of PP8 (WPL) Italian Ministry for the Environment. The assessments took into account:


- The general organization of these different Alpine States.
- The national legislative framework concerning nature protection and spatial planning.
- The existing legislation both at the national and regional level and ongoing experiences in the field of transboundary cooperation, as well as the implementation of the EGCT (European Grouping on Territorial Cooperation) in each State.

the COMPARATIVE OUTLOOKS

Pursuant to Action 6.2, a series of four comparative outlooks (Italy/France, Switzerland/Italy, Austria/Germany and Italy/Austria) were produced by PP8 and PP9. PP11 Region Valle d'Aosta and PP12 Alpi Marittime Natural Park contributed to the drafting of the comparisons between France and Italy and Italy and Switzerland.

PP8 also held regular consultations with both UNEP and FAO to ensure the global dimension was taken into account.


The legal situation of protected areas in each couple of neighbouring Alpine States was examined with the goal of identifying the most appropriate tools to establish and/or maintain ecological corridors and networks. Legal instruments were examined, pilot regions of the ECONNECT project were presented as case studies.


a SYNTHESIS DOCUMENT

the DOMODOSSOLA and GRENOBLE Proceedings

On 17 April 2009, pursuant to Action 6.3, PP9 organized a first transnational workshop in Domodossola. The workshop, by the title of "The legal framework of protected areas in each Alpine State", aimed at identifying the legal situation of protected areas in each Alpine State, with an emphasis on transboundary issues such as Natura 2000 and the creation of an Alpine ecological network.

A thematic conference on the legal aspects of transboundary cooperation among protected areas was also held by PP8 alongside the workshop.

Pursuant to Action 6.4, on 6 May 2010, CIPRA organized a second transnational workshop by the title of "Legal barriers and possibilities for the implementation of ecological corridors in the Alps". About forty people took part in the event, trying to assess the capacity of currently available legal tools to cope with the new challenge of ecological connectivity in the Alps.

Prior to the workshop a questionnaire was prepared and disseminated by PP8, PP9 and CIPRA. Moreover, under the coordination of PP8, PP9 prepared a synthesis for decision-makers, which collects the key results of the project component.


